

Shock figures show almost 200 construction workers killed since 2013



No one should go to work not knowing if they are going to make it through the day unharmed – or even alive says GMB Union

Almost 200 construction workers have been killed and more than 26,000 seriously injured at work in recent years, shocking statistics reveal.

A total of **195 people have been killed** doing construction work since 2013, official figures show.



Causes of death include falls, electrocution, explosions, drowning and asphyxiation.

A further 26,007 have suffered injuries such as fractures, amputations, serious burns and loss of consciousness.

Between 2010 and 2020, the Conservative led Government will have cut funding and resources from the Health and Safety Executive by £100 million.
